WHERE WE RING

ST OLAVE, HART STREET

8 bells, 11-3-23 in G.

This has been the UL headquarters since 1954, when the bells were put in, and the UL is responsible for the ringing and upkeep of these bells. This year being 60 years since the UL arrived.

The bells were cast in 1952/3 with the tenor being recast in 1972. These are one of two light rings of eight in the City, the other being St James, Garlickhythe. The bells are pleasant although they are quite odd-struck, which the UL is currently looking to sorting out.

As communications are quite good with the church, the bells have become increasingly available for visiting bands, peals and quarter peals.

Ringing schedule: Practices are held every Thursday during term time - from 7-8.30pm. There are also some out of term practices organised by the Master. Service ringing is on the first and third Sundays from 10.15-11am.



ST CLEMENT DANES, STRAND 10 bells, 21-1-23 in E



A good, easy-going ring of 10 bells, there is also a flat fourth in the tower which allows the bells to play the "Oranges and Lemons" nursery rhyme tune every 3 hours: — even though the bells are unlikely to be the ones mentioned in the rhyme. The UL has long-standing links with the tower, having quarter peal slots on a monthly basis. We currently provide service ringing on the first and second Sundays of each month—following the morning service. The ringing time tends to be from 12 noon, and is organised in the form of a quarter peal attempt. We also provide ringing for services at other times when requested. Our connection with Sunday service ringing has meant that in the past few years we have been offered peal slots with no peal fee.

ST GILES-WITHOUT-CRIPPLEGATE

12 bells, 34-0-6 in C#

A challenging ring of 12, with a sharp second to provide a light ring of 8. Most of the difficulties with ringing the bells come from the tower movement which means that some of the bells plummet without warning. Perhaps one of the great rings of bells in London, along with St Mary-le-Bow, they sound fantastic with a good band ringing them. This year the UL has started to ring for services at Cripplegate again on the second Sunday of each month from 9.20 to 10am. We join other local ringers to help ring all 12 bells.

Incidentally, the UL was also drawn to ring here in the National 12 bell eliminators for 2014.



ST BARTHOLOMEW-THE-GREAT, SMITHFIELD

5 bells, 51/2 cwt in B



"The best ring of 5 in London": - a statement which is not a lie, but is probably also not true. These bells have remained largely untouched for many years, and are a complete ring of five cast around 1510. Even though they are quite light they feel much heavier when you ring them. They are quite tricky and odd struck meaning that it is often hard to try and persuade people to come and ring here.

Our monthly quarter peal slot remains on the 4th Sunday at 5.30pm to ring for the 6.30pm service.

MASTER'S REPORT

This year has been yet another successful one for the UL, with some excellent ringing, social and drinking events.

Practice nights have continued, on Thursdays at Hart Street with a high attendance most weeks. The repertoire of the Thursday night practices tends to be Stedman Triples and upwards, although most of our ringing this year has been various levels of Surprise Major, including simple spliced and 8-spliced most weeks. The plan of ringing up to the Nottingham 8 in spliced is not quite there yet, as although we have rung all the methods on their own, it hasn't been regular enough; hopefully this will be something to build on in the future. We have also held occasional practices at most of the twelves in London this year, and on a number of occasions we were able to ring Bristol Max, with support from some of our older members.

The handbell practices have seem to have petered out, with not enough enthusiasm every Thursday. We have been able to hold occasional sessions to give people a go at ringing the basics – Plain Hunt and Plain Bob, but there was more enthusiasm at Christmas when we decided to ring carols on the handbells to raise funds for the Southwark Cathedral bells rehang project.

Service ringing on the first and third Sundays at Hart Street has had good attendance for the majority of the year. We have managed to ring for every single Sunday service since May 2013, including Easter Sunday, which probably has not been done for a number of years. There were only three Sundays when we were not able to ring on all 8 bells. Our Sunday repertoire has tended to be simpler things so that we can ring them well. This has included Call Changes, Grandsire, Stedman and single Surprise Major methods. On a couple of occasions we have been able to ring 8-spliced. It's good to see a number of keen people getting up to ring on Sundays, as ringing for divine service is one of the objectives of the society.

One change I've implemented for Sundays is that we now go for breakfast at the Crosse Keys: – the service is much quicker, there are far more seats and it is not full with tourists like the Liberty Bounds.

There has been some out of term time ringing throughout the last year which proved popular as there are not many other places to go on Thursday nights. During the Easter Holiday some quarter peal attempts were organised, including a half muffled attempt for Maundy Thursday.

Throughout the year we provided ringing for a few other special events, including the Samuel Pepys memorial service, where the Lord Mayor was in attendance and the church midweek carol service. We also attempted peals for the Rector's 25th Anniversary of Ordination, the birth of Prince George, and the 300th Anniversary of Fabian Stedman's death, although unfortunately these all came to grief.

In addition to ringing for services and special events at Hart Street, we have also attempted quarter peals following the morning service at St Clement Danes on the first and second Sundays. These have mainly been used for people to consolidate methods, and a lot of Surprise Major has been rung, but we have also rung on six bells and ten bells. We unfortunately lost a quarter peal attempt of London Royal here back in June and it is something which should be reattempted in the not too distant future. Also, fortunately, we managed to lose an attempt of Grandsire Caters on the back nine! I have tried to keep these quarters going as much as possible, including some out of term ringing but there have had to be a number of cancellations recently due to other events in the church. A total of 16 quarter peals were scored at Danes.

On the fourth Sunday of each month the UL continues to have a quarter peal slot at St Bart's. There were six attempts throughout the year although only four of them were scored, and I accidentally neglected to organise a few other attempts. In general it hasn't been too hard to get bands together to ring here as I have mostly been asking people who have not rung at the tower before: - and the old phrase of "the best ring of 5 in the City" always seems to work.

On second Sundays we have restarted helping with service ringing at St Giles, Cripplegate. Gwen Rogers is grateful for the extra support and it is nice to be able to help ring all twelve for Sunday mornings. For next year we are likely to be allowed to have an afternoon quarter peal slot for their evensong service and this could be used to help encourage ten and twelve bell ringing in the society.

In January we had a quarter peal weekend on the anniversary of Roger Bailey's death where we attempted quarters at several towers and rang a few touches at Queen's tower. The event seemed quite popular and encouraged a number of people to ring firsts in method. I hope that this will be repeated next year.

This year has seen a healthy number of peals being rung by UL bands. There was a total of 10 peals rung, including eight successful attempts from peal weekend. I'd like to mention particularly David, Sophie and Jenny who all scored their first peals.

In addition to UL peals, St Olave's Society scored 5 peals this year.

The UL entered five striking competitions this year which were:

- ⇒ The Middlesex 8-bell, held at Garlickhythe, where we came 10th out of 12
- \Rightarrow The London 12 bell 5th out of 10
- ⇒ The SUA where we came first in the 8 bell and third in the 6 bell
- \Rightarrow The National 12-bell eliminators 6^{th} out of 7
 - This was the first time in 30 years that the UL entered the competition. The band was composed of a team of people under 30 years old so none of us were born the last time we entered. We had a lot of practices and certainly did an excellent job on the day. Hopefully we will be able to enter again next year, and use it as an excuse to improve everyone's 12-bell ringing and not just those who are in the band.
- ⇒ The Tewkesbury shield 8th out of 9

 The band for this year's competition was composed of 10 of the 12 who rang in the 12-bell band. Unfortunately as the competition was so close to the Easter Holiday, there was not much chance to practice the tricky touch of Plain and Little with the whole band, but we were quite pleased to get the touch to come round.

We've had five brilliant tours this year:

- ⇒ Summer weekend tour to Guildford, organised by Chris Rimmer. It was dubbed as "Cycle if you want tour" after the majority of the UL decided to go in cars
- ⇒ Summer tour to Birmingham, organised by Jenny and Sophie which involved ringing on 16 at the Bull Ring, a day round Worcester and Coventry, as well as a trip to Cadbury World
- ⇒ Freshers' Tour to East London, organised by Becca but with no Freshers to be seen
- ⇒ Winter Tour to Oxford, which Jenny organised, where we rang at most of the rings of bells in the city and had a late night return journey
- ⇒ Easter Tour to Wareham, organised by Mariko. We visited Brownsea Island, where the society has now rung a quarter peal and also had nearly the last lot of ringing on the old tenor at Wareham.

All of the tours have been very enjoyable and we have achieved some respectable ringing, drinking and socialising – and fortunately we didn't get kicked out of the Summer tour accommodation this year either – many thanks go to all the tour organisers who took on these mammoth tasks!

I would like to thank all those who have supported UL practices and events in this last year, the committee for working well together and particular thanks to Sophie and Chris for organising things throughout October whilst I was not able to be at practices.

Finally, I would like to wish the next Master good luck for the year ahead: – it's a difficult job but so rewarding when hard work pays off.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

This year has been another great year for the UL both for ringing, but more importantly socialising. Congratulations to David and Ruth Hills on the birth of their son Robert, and to Hellen Richardson and Mark Williams who were married on AGM day last year, so they just make it into this report.

As this is our 60th year ringing at Hart St, I would like to give a special thanks to the church, including Charlotte the church secretary and the Rector for being especially generous this year - allowing us to ring many quarter peals and peals. We have also had many more visitors to the tower this year including ten visiting bands, the lovely Gabi from German radio who even came back twice after our show was so popular, and we even had a visit from the paranormal (see Chris Rimmer for details).

We have had a variety of social events this year including an impromptu boat ride and picnic in Greenwich Park followed by a bbq, bowling at Christmas, and a trip to see Phantom of the Opera organised by Jacqui. One member enjoyed it so much that he even went to Poland to watch it again. A highlight has to be summer tour last year with the gaining of a new mascot (Little Bob) and the strange behaviour of one member throwing spoons through the window in the early hours of the morning.

There also seems to have been many more events that have required drinking up the tower this year, which definitely improved our ringing and led to many nights out from the Windsor to the Bounds to the BEM. Christmas practice was a highlight with Ryan's work party playlist and copious amounts of dancing. This year has been full of many achievements and next year seems even more promising, including a dinner day peal at St Martin's already accepted. Thank you to everyone for making this year as secretary so enjoyable and good luck to next year's secretary.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Key Points

- \Rightarrow Income for the year was £1,491.78
- \Rightarrow Expenditure for the year was £392.11
- \Rightarrow Overall funds increased from £3,472.79 to £4,572.46
- The income and expenditure amounts need to be adjusted significantly in order to reflect the actual year in which expense and income was made.

Income

Income from peals and quarters has been above average this year at £79.55; steeplage has been quite low at just £29.50. This is partly because there is some steeplage up the tower that has not been recorded in the accounts, but taking this into account it is still quite low. It is probably sensible for future treasurers to keep gently reminding people to contribute. Weddings and visiting ringers have been in line with previous years. Peals and quarters, steeplage, weddings & visiting ringers summed to £459.05, this is the largest component of income for the year (when other income is accounted for in the year it actually applies rather than when booked in the accounts).

The dinner profit for dinner 2013 hadn't been paid into the accounts before the year-end, but was £90. In the accounts there is the line item "income/profit" for £366, this only reflects part of the income for the sales, the total profit for the year will be in next year's accounts, the expected profit being £84.99.

The 'The Trafalgar Square Handbells' income was £305.55; this money has been raised for Southwark and has been paid out in the 2014-2015 accounts. £90 of the London 12 Bell profit was used to pay for entry to the National 12 Bell account.

By stripping out the effects of T-Shirt Sales and Trafalgar Square Handbells, the income is broadly in line with previous years.

Expenditure

The cost of handbell insurance this year increased from £60.42 to £72.01, therefore the decision was made to move insurance to Allianz for next year, which should roughly halve the cost. The main reason that expenditure has been a lot lower than previous years is because there have been no large one off payments, and several expenses haven't been accounted for.

Other

The Halifax account has been closed and the money moved into the Natwest account.

My main failure for the year was my inability to get the accounts online, there are few reasons for this. Initially finding a suitable account with suitable governance requires multiple signatories on the account, this was quite hard to find. I was also concerned that any new account with online payments etc wouldn't fufill the requirement of the Society to ensure that the treasurer couldn't make a unilateral decision to make a payment without permission from at least one other member of the committee. On top of this I simply haven't put enough time into researching and therefore ultimately didn't pursue online banking to its end. I would recommend that the next treasurer does continue to look into this and I am happy to give my support in this necessary step for the UL accounts.

Finally I would like to apologise to my successor for not handing over the accounts in a more timely fashion, this was partly due to some missing bank statements but, again, I didn't put enough time into closing them off at the year-end.

STEEPLEKEEPERS' REPORT

Bells

Over the past year, routine maintenance has been carried out on the bells, although the sixth stay is still cracked [Ed. – it isn't cracked!!]. This is being sorted and the stay should be replaced before the new term starts.

All the ropes were replaced this year and adjustments were made as necessary.

The bells themselves are a little bit odd-struck and we are currently in discussions with various bell foundries and installers to help rectify this. We had a quote from Whites of Appleton for £730 + VAT which was thought to be a bit expensive.

There is also a plan for a working party up the tower before the summer is finished for a spring clean and doing what we can to help fix any odd-struckness ourselves.

The frame is still rusty (no surprise there) -a repaint will be required in the next few years. If we have willing volunteers, there is no reason why we cannot do this ourselves.

Dickon Love visited to give us some advice on what to do with our sound control to make it usable.

Fabric

The outside door lock is holding up and there have been no signs of any change, therefore I think we should keep monitoring it and see how it goes.

Ringing Chamber

The ringing chamber is kept "fairly" clean, although a new hoover is required – a heavy duty 'Henry' would be most sensible as this could then be used in cleaning further up the tower.

The collection box has finally had a lock fitted, and it has been secured to the wall.

MIDDLESEX 8 BELL STRIKING COMPETITION 30th May 2013

This year the UL entered the Middlesex 8-bell competition, organised by Tom Lawrence and held at Garlickhythe. This was the second time that we have entered the competition. Unfortunately due to the cross-over between the old and new Master there was some confusion of how the band was going to be organised. Fortunately, we managed to gather eight people together to ring Grandsire Triples.

The draw, which took place at 2.30pm, initially looked like the UL were going to end up ringing eleventh (out of twelve teams) much to Chris Rimmer's disappointment as he wanted to get home and study! Fortunately, one team were quite keen to swap, so we ended up bravely taking the spot of ringing first. Due to our disorganisation, we weren't able to have a practice before the competition, however we went ahead and produced a fairly respectable piece of ringing – apparently far better than last year's attempt which nearly fired out (or so I'm told!)

Five of us were persuaded to ring in other teams, so we hung around most of the afternoon... and Andrew Brown ended up ringing for six teams in the end!! After we rang, Chris and Sophie headed off to continue with revision, whilst Ben B went to go and get ready for the UCL ball. The rest of us quickly headed up the road to where we would spend most of the afternoon in Ye Olde Watling and we got some beers in!

Unfortunately the judges – Charles Botting from High Wycombe and David Cox from Egham seemed to be in some disagreement about the placing of some bands and we ended up with tenth place – although two bands did not finish, so I'm not counting it as losing! However they did have quite a tough time with about three hours of judging to do! LONDON 12-BELL STRIKING COMPETITION 26th October 2013

The London 12 Bell Competition for the Whitechapel Trophy this year was hosted by the University of London Society. The UL is not one of the larger societies taking part in the competition, but what it lacks in size it more than makes up for with youthful enthusiasm. Having taken on the organisation of the fifth competition and, by kind permission of the rector The Rev Philip Warner, and tower keeper Dickon Love, decided to return it to the first host venue, St Magnus the Martyr, the UL did what it does best and had a bit of a dither.

Then as the build up to the competition came and team after team booked Magnus bells to practice the test piece – a half-course of Cambridge Surprise Maximus – minds were focused and the real strength of a large group of active

and committed students (and exstudents) really came into its own. Early in the morning the troops arrived, Jacqui Bale brought a dairy worth of milk, Becca Cullen a suitcase packed with bacon, too many UL members to name arrived with home-baked cakes. A rather large number of which had been baked the previous evening, after the UL's last I2-bell band practice, or the same morning, due to staying later than intended in the



pub. In the church the cake stall took shape and Great British Bake-off would have been proud, whilst downstairs the kitchen resembled a mass catering challenge from Masterchef, as 120 rolls were buttered and 240 rashers of bacon cooked. Becca, leading the catering team, remained calm under fire. While this was going on, Adrian and Helen Udal transformed the rector's study into judging HQ, for Martin Whiteley (Chief), Maggie Whiteley and Liz Orme, with a sound-feed to ensure that no detail was missed. As the church started to fill with excited ringers, we were relieved to feel ready for the day.

The London 12 bell competition has some novelties, setting it aside from other ringing competitions. The name gives it away, but it is for London teams who ring on 12 within Greater London. With a range of ringing societies eligible, some of course ring more frequently on 12 than others, which means the competition for middle order placing is often as hotly contested as at the top. You don't have to ring in London for long to realise there are a lot of towers, and a lot of challenging rings of 12. In order to have sufficient ringers for so many of these towers, most individuals ring with more than one band. A typical Sunday involves a network of individuals crossing the city to ensure all the bells are rung. The London 12 bell competition recognises and embraces this fact, allowing people to ring for 2 bands, with further rules specifying that a person can't ring the same bell and that bands can't be constituted of more than 50% of the same ringers as another band. The competition's Secretary, Michael Uphill, has the unenviable task on the morning of the competition of comparing team sheets to ensure we comply with these rules. When he announced at the draw that all teams were eligible there was a great feeling of relief that the jigsaw puzzle had worked.

After a welcome by competition Chair Stephen Mitchell, Alan Hughes, who donated the Whitechapel Trophy, conducted the draw. After a series of late draws, the Southwark team was delighted to be drawn fourth. The St Paul's Cathedral band much less pleased to be drawn tenth and last to ring.

During the ringing period the competition can feel quite rushed – each band has a 20min slot in which to practice and complete the test piece – which means that the changeovers between bands need to be speedily accomplished. With ringers being in up to two bands even the logistics of meeting with the correct number at the bottom of the tower can be challenging: you can't just assume a missing ringer is lost or late, they might already be upstairs ringing.

The test piece is another novelty of this competition. This year's piece was the first 6 leads of Cambridge Max, although the first 2 leads were not marked. The judges commented that this was a good system, allowing bands to settle into the rhythm, but they had found a perceptible change when bands moved from the un-marked to the marked section.

One part of event management that is always tricky is getting the landlord of the designated pub to believe just how much ringers will consume: beer (lots), food (lots) and lager (next to nothing). Perhaps due to the late draw of St Paul's Cathedral, who have never let ringing get in the way of keeping the bar busy, and the relatively early draw of Southwark, it didn't take too long for the pub to be drunk dry. Although the upside was that motivating people to leave a pub without beer for the results did not seem to be difficult.

The judges efficiently turned around the results in just over an hour after the last band rang – a mammoth undertaking given there were 10 teams to be ranked. Bang on the scheduled time, Martin Whiteley as Chief Judge gave us a general overview of the ringing that had taken place during the day. Maggie Whiteley took us through peal speeds and comments for each band and then Liz Orme gave the all important results, before Competition certificates, designed by Andrew Hills, were presented to the top-3 bands and the trophy was presented by Alan Hughes to Shirley McGill and Olly Cross for the Cumberlands, the first time this society has won this competition. One result of ringers being eligible for more than one band is the possibility of some mixed emotions at results time, sometimes by a considerable margin. This year one ringer was in the winning team and the one that came last.

After the results a new pub was required and many of the participants made the short walk over the river to The Sheaf, where we made significant in-roads into their beer and jager-bomb stocks. No doubt there were many people who benefitted from the additional hour's sleep overnight as the clocks went back – surely an essential



feature for the day after any striking competition.

CHRISTMAS HANDBELLS Throughout December 2013

Having taken a break last year, it was decided that the UL should once again entertain the shoppers of London with carols, raising money for the Southwark Cathedral bell fund.

After a few ad-hoc practices in early November, Jacqui started to organise some proper practice sessions. It was at this point we found out that we would be doing not one, but four performances, and that we were unlikely to have a single band able to make all four. Fortunately there were enough of us to swap in and out, and we soon had a schedule in place.

Practices then commenced in earnest, meeting early each Thursday and most Sundays, including lugging the bells to various towers around London to fit a few hours extra in here and there. We decided that learning all the music was unrealistic, so we slimmed our repertoire down to a half-hour set, ending with an increasingly enthusiastically rung Jingle Bells.

As the first performance approached, last minute preparations included polishing up the bells, acquiring suitably Christmassy jumpers, decorating buckets for donations and figuring out what we were going to do with the music. Fortunately Jacqui came through with a set of music stands she generously donated to the UL.

Our first show was on Friday 6th December at Tachbrook Street Market, near Victoria. After the Mayor of Westminster turned on the Christmas tree lights we played for about an hour, alternating pieces with the Westminster Community Choir. The shoppers seemed very appreciative of our efforts, including one elderly lady who talked at us at great length while we were trying to concentrate on the trickier parts of Silent Night. As we were finishing, one mother informed us that her young children were so enthralled with our playing that they had insisted on rushing home to get their pocket money to throw in our buckets. After packing up, the nearest pub was located, and, for some, a major drinking session commenced.

The following day we were due to play at Southwark Cathedral Christmas
Market for a good part of the afternoon.
The bells, buckets and music stands, and most of the ringers arrived at
Southwark around midday, only to be informed that certain members had possibly taken the last night's drinking too far, and the music had been left in a pub in Shoreditch. Fortunately, we were assured that the Master was on the case, and had been frantically printing out new copies all morning (thankfully



Jacqui had uploaded all the music to the website for such an event...). True enough, moments before we were due to start, Ryan arrived not only with newly-printed music, but all put together in folders ready for us to go.

We played in several locations around the Cathedral for most of the afternoon, until it got too dark to see the music. Our initial compliment was augmented as the day went on, as Becca arrived from Lewes and Jenny Willis managed to make it, after (understandably) assuming Southwark Cathedral was near Southwark tube. With all the music run through four or five times, we were getting increasingly confident and the final encore of Jingle Bells was played at break-neck speed.

With the light failing, we headed back to Hart Street to count up our takings, while Ryan went to try and locate the original music sets. A last-minute donation was added to the pot outside the Draft House on Seething Lane where Mr Blobby asked for a kiss from Becca (or 'girl with the mistletoe' as she was addressed). The total for the day ended up at over £150.

After another practice session on the Sunday, we agreed that we were now confident enough to add two of the trickier tunes to our set for Monday. We arrived in Leicester Square around 4pm where we found that locating a position with enough light to play meant we were battling with the noise of fairground rides and a mic'd up singer. Despite this, we played well, though some of us were starting to get blisters from ringing the bells so hard. After packing up the bells into backpacks, most of us then headed south of the river to see Saving Mr Banks (which was agreed to be excellent).

The final performance was on Saturday 14th, on Oxford Street. As was to be expected 11 days before Christmas, it was extremely busy, but most people were rushing past with no time to stop and appreciate our, by now excellent, playing. We'd gotten confident enough to add in the challenging Ding Dong Merrily on High as well as a new descant to liven up the end of The First Noel. After almost two hours playing, everyone was exhausted and happy to head back to Hart Street and then the Bounds.

After a final count up, we'd raised a total of almost £300 over our four days, plus a few rupees, kroner and euros. We all agreed that this was a great result, and also that we'd rather not play any more handbells for a while.

Details of all the quarters that we rang can be found in the quarter peal section of the Annual Report.


