COVID-19 Notice

Unfortunately, due to the ongoing (as of late 2021) COVID-19 pandemic, many events had to be adjusted or scrapped all together. For this reason, the following events did not occur:

With the exception of the 2020 Treasure Hunt & Freshers' Tour, all events were primarily held online, including the 2020 & 2021 AGMs and 2020 AuGM. Handbell ringing in person was common, but most tower-bell ringing was restricted.

No tower-bell peals or quarters were rung by the ULSCR or Saint Olave's Society
30 quarters were rung on Ringing Room & 14 were rung on handbells for the society.
There were no peals rung on either Ringing Room or on Handbells

Master's Report

Practices have run all year from the last AGM, and while they have all been online, they have all been very well attended throughout the year and have focused on both tower and hand bell ringing. On tower bells we rang anything from plain bob minor up to basic surprise major, this was greatly helped by many members of the band being well versed at ringing 2 bells. Hand bell ringing was also very popular, with similar stuff being rung, but with a greater focus on surprise minor and major. From experience this year, I will highly recommend the UL keeps using Ringing Room moving forward, especially through holidays and to keep in touch with members of the society further afield.

Due to Hart Street not initially meeting the strict COVID ringing guidelines after the first lockdown of 2020, we decided to do some ringing at a tower that had no local band, adequate transport links and had a big enough rope circle to accommodate the then guidelines. Poplar All saints was a perfect candidate for this, so we got in touch and began ringing early on a Sunday morning there, even continuing to do so when Hart Street was open for ringing again.

At both towers this was restricted to ringing on 3 to 5 bells at a time and only 15 minutes a session, so in person practices weren't practically an option. A lot of bob minimus and stedman singles was rung as a result. Later in 2020 when restrictions were increased, ringing at Poplar unfortunately had to be cancelled and Hart street was limited to ellacombe ringing only, this was conducted by myself and Sonja on alternating weeks as we both lived in London at the time and knew how to operate the ellacoumbes.

Many events had to be cancelled or delayed until later in 2021 due to COVID restrictions at the time, these unfortunately included: The 2020 Summer tour, the 2020 & 2021 Easter Tours and SUA 2020, which we were due to host.

Though other events did go ahead in some form. While restrictions were at their lowest in summer 2020, Chris & Roxy organised the UL treasure hunt, an all-round fun day that helped break the monotony of the first lockdown and had good participation from the wider society.

To start the academic year off, we had our mini freshers' tour where we properly welcomed John and Sam. A band consisting of our two freshers' as well as myself, Sonja & Bethan rang at Poplar, Stepney, Hart Street & Camberwell. The outing ended up being one of the few occasions the society rang on actual tower bells. The only other main occasion was a touch of 75 Bob Minimus at Hart Street in October to celebrate the UL's 75th birthday.

In November, Sean chaired his first AuGM for the society and along with the virtual dinner which he primarily organised, went very smoothly. And even though we couldn't hold either in person, both were very well attended.

As we entered 2021 It was clear that the society would still be stuck online for the next few months and as such Roger Bailey day and Peal weekend would have to be relegated to Ringing Room and Zoom. The two weekends were held a week apart, and after doing battle with poor internet connections we managed to get 5 successful quarter peals on Ringing Room between the two events. Congratulations to everyone who managed to score one. In the end, instead of the year of celebration that this should have been, this year has been one of the most chaotic, tiresome and, to be blatantly honest, unpleasant in living memory. However, the society has persisted through it all. So far, we have survived one of the worst worldwide tragedies since this society began, and we can only continue to go up from here. I want to give a special thanks to everyone who has served on the committee with me, it has been great to work with you all and the society wouldn't be in the position it is today without your hard work and dedication.

And finally thank you to everyone in the society who helped me learn the virtual ropes of the mastership. I feel truly honoured to have been given such an opportunity.

In the accounts for year ended 31st March 2021, the Society stands at £4,009.77, down from £4934.60 at the end of March last year.

The reasons for these changes are well-known to the Society – we made a loss of £2962.50 in June 2020 from the cancellation of our annual dinner. This hit to the Society has – as a result of incredible generosity from some members – been softened: We have received a total of £2297.50 in donations, and my thanks extend to those who did reach deep into their pockets for the UL. Financial constraints on the committee have now been implemented, mandating that any transaction above £500 be approved by the Society-at-large. These constraints are subject to amendment by the membership and may be written into the Constitution at a future time. More details on this matter were circulated by Sean last November.

In terms of other losses that the Society has incurred, the accounts report a loss of £218.16 from a UL clothing order in Summer 2020. This is not a loss; instead, the money collected for the clothing order was collected in last year's financial period. A comparison of the income and expenditure for the same order indicates that the Society made a profit of £25.84.

Outside of these figures, the accounts have not been too busy this year. With the absence of a dinner and no in-person activities, I expect these figures to remain stable next year, and as such, I make no proposal for changing the membership fees, currently set at £10 for life membership, and £0 for peals.

The Society's inventory currently includes:

- 2 65th anniversary pint glasses (-2)

In addition to the items listed above there appears to be a slightly less generous selection of alcohol stored in the cupboard than we previously reported. The clothing and bedding we previously reported on seems to have grown in number, please could the owners collect it before it is removed. In the belfry there are many bags of rock wool for sound control, floor mats and various pieces of wood scattered.

A few particular things to note this year:

1. One item has been removed from the inventory and six items have been added to the Society's property list. A number of items of property are in disrepair as noted above.
2. The library is overflowing; in need of new storage. Some items are in boxes stored around the ringing room. Several years of Ringing World issues remain unbound. A decision needs to be taken what to do about these rather than letting them pile up.
3. Whilst we note that the Captain's hat is on the UL property list, we were unable to find it and it has been assumed that the last known Captain has the hat. If you have the hat, please make us aware.
4. We recommend that the lost property/damaged/superfluous items are sold or donate to worthy causes.
5. We've had a few years where there has been issues with the handbell insurance and this was left to lapse between December 2020 and April 2021. Sean has rectified this and the new policy dates have been included in the Trustees' report.

There is only 1 member that I am aware of who has died during the year. W Emma S Cundiff joined the UL in 1983 while studying at South Bank Polytechnic. She served on the Committee between 1983 and 1988 becoming Treasurer in 1987. She rang 21 peals for the Society including one by an undergraduate band in 1984. Emma died on 9 December 2020 aged just 56.

I would also like to mention the death of Paul A Williams. Although not a member of the Society, Paul was very supportive of the UL over many years. Indeed he had more than one attempt to join the Society, but was judged not to meet our strict eligibility criteria! Nevertheless, I feel it is appropriate to record our appreciation of the generous support he gave to the UL as a whole and to many members individually. Paul died on 13 December 2020 at the age of 68.

Current membership stands at 674 although this inevitably includes many who are no longer alive but whose death has not been recorded in the membership database. As usual, if anyone becomes aware of a member or former member who has died, I'd be grateful if they would let me know.

Steeple Keeper's Report

The most important thing to note this year is that in both spring 2020 and winter/spring 2020/2021 the bells spent a prolonged period being unused, due to COVID restrictions at the time. After both of these, the bells were checked over before ringing commenced and were deemed to be in a safe condition.

As there has been very little ringing on the bells, there has been no further visible wear on the ropes since last year and no stays have been broken.

There was also a long period in late 2020 where only the ellacoumbes were used to ring the bells. Before change ringing restarted in the tower, the hammers were checked to make sure none of them had gotten stuck and that the bells will clear them as usual when rung normally.

As of Friday 07/05/2021, all 14 hand bells are in their case in the tower.

The next set of guidelines set by the Central Council (due to commence in mid May) will allow for 6 ringers in a tower at a time with 1 metre spacing between them.

The distances between the ropes have been measured and are as follows:

1 to 2 is 70cm	5 to 6 is 80cm
2 to 3 is 70cm	6 to 7 is 70cm
3 to 4 is 115cm	7 to 8 is 70cm
4 to 5 is 130cm	8 to 1 is 145cm

Because of this, accounting for realistic distances between ringers, 6 bells can be rung at a time under current regulations if the combination of bells 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8 is used, this both allows for maximised spacing and a musically acceptable combination. Markers will be placed on the floor of the ringing chamber soon to indicate where people should stand while ringing.

There are also 3 fleeces/jumpers unclaimed in the ringing chamber.

Treasure Hunt

ULSCR 75th Anniversary Celebrations

2020 to 2021, Written up by Sean Langton

The University of London Society of Change Ringers (ULSCR) was founded on Monday 12 October 1945, 75 years ago. There were plans to mark this milestone with, amongst other things, a special 75th Anniversary edition of our annual anniversary dinner and a peal at Imperial College's Queens Tower at Christmas. However, many of the plans fell foul to the COVID-19 pandemic, but that didn't mean that the show couldn't go on in some form or another and plans were formed to celebrate in a more COVID-friendly fashion.

On anniversary day, some of our current students arranged ringing at St Olave Hart Street our base, getting us underway with a 75 change performance of Plain Bob. It was, obviously, not possible to extend this to our wider membership given the current regulations. There were also two anniversary day handbell touches of 75 changes. All members of the society were encouraged to follow these examples and to do some ringing during the year in order to mark the anniversary. Tower bell quarters and peals are probably a long way off, but short bursts were possible. Luckily there are many seasoned handbell ringers in the society so a good few handbell quarters were rung.

As I mentioned the annual dinner was a casualty of the pandemic, instead an online event was planned, there was a lot of socialising and a UL/ringing/general knowledge themed quiz. The ringing master also gave his speech (a pandemic didn't seem like a good enough excuse to let him get away without this mastership rite of passage).

We are hoping we can organise an in-person celebration during the summer months next year when, even if there are still restrictions on social gatherings, it should be easier to manage. In the meantime, we continue to hold weekly Ringing Room practices followed by a 'pub' session. If there is an advantage to come from the pandemic it is that we don't need to be in London to have a practice. This has allowed practices to continue throughout the summer vacation and allowed alumni to easily drop into and support the practice without having to plan in advance to travel to London. We have even recruited several new students and have been ringing regularly for services in person at both Hart Street and All Saints, Poplar.
